Program Notes

Messiah

an Oratorio* for Chorus and Orchestra with Soprano, Alto, Tenor, and Bass soloists

by George Frideric Handel (Born: Halle, Germany, February 23, 1685 Died: London, April 14, 1759)

First Performed in Dublin, April 13, 1742

*Oratorio - A dramatic poem, usually of a sacred or epic nature, set for soloists, chorus, and full orchestra, and ordinarily performed without sets or costumes.

In 1564, a priest from Florence, Filippo Neri, began a lecture series in Rome on Biblical History in the Oratory of the church of San Girolamo della Carità. To illustrate his points and to liven up his lecture, he decided to use *Laudi spirituali* or hymns. This priest's attempts to make his lectures more interesting led to the development of the oratorio or, more properly and in Italian, *Rappresentazione per il oratorio*.

As Father Neri's idea caught on, there was a demand for new hymns to accompany the lectures and most of the composers jumped at the chance to produce new music with a new purpose. Eventually the music, consisting mostly of choruses, became more pertinent and assumed a greater dramatic continuity, growing into almost a Mystery with purposes of moralization. The presentations were often allegorical with characters with names like Joy or Time, etc. Historically, the most important of these early works is Emilio de' Cavalieri's *La Rappresentazione di anima e di corpo*, produced in Rome in 1600; this is generally considered to be the first oratorio. By the way, the title means "A representation of the soul and the body." Cavalieri certainly did not wince at tackling big subjects.

As the opera form gained popularity in Italy during the 17th and 18th centuries, its favor moved north, eventually including all of Europe. Not coincidentally, another form of the oratorio, the "oratorio volgare" evolved, which closely resembled the opera. It placed strong emphasis on recitatives and arias and frequently employed the same virtuosic singers who had gained a large following in the realm of opera and thus popularized this evolving form of the oratorio. Another factor that opera and the oratorio volgare fashioned was the emergence of the professional female singer, who had been generally excluded from singing in public performances and churches.

Although the volgare oratorio lacked the costumes and acting associated with the opera, the singers represented characters, often drawn from the Bible, and recounted, sometimes quite loosely, biblical stories. Since secular concerts, and especially performances of opera, were either frowned upon or banned during the Advent and Lenten season, this new form of oratorio filled a natural void for the opera loving audience.

Handel made the chorus an integral and essential part of his oratorios. He used it for dramatic effects, particularly to mark a climax, as well as for reflective purposes. The chorus is, indeed, the very kernel of the Handel oratorio. At the same time, Handel employed all types of arias, including the bravura aria, and practically banished the recitativo secco in favor of the dramatic recitative. His treatment of the vocal fugue rivals Bach's mastery of the instrumental fugue. In the field of oratorio, Handel remains a lonely giant, looming far above his competitors.

One of his efforts, that which we present today, *Messiah*, so pervades our world that there is hardly a single person who hasn't at least heard of it and, in fact, can probably sing the *Hallelujah Chorus*. Few composers can equal this accomplishment, but most would also have to say that part of the reason for this particular oratorio's pervasive popularity is its subject matter. This text is the story of Jesus, the Son of God, the Messiah; and the inspiration coming from the Biblical text is partly responsible for the oratorio's abiding popularity. But when the inspirational text combines with this music, the reason for the work's enduring popularity is unavoidable. And it took Handel only a little over three weeks to compose this wonderful score.

Soloists

Erin Smith, Soprano



Praised for her "rich and beautiful voice", soprano Erin M. Smith is quickly establishing herself as a versatile and dynamic performer on the Boston music scene. In New England, Erin has been featured with Opera Providence, Cape Cod Opera, Raylynmor Opera, Boston Opera Collaborative, MetroWest Opera, Boston Metro Opera, Piccola Opera, The Boston New Music Initiative, Opera del West, The Falmouth Chorale, Chorus North Shore. The Choral Art

Society of the South Shore, The Newton Community Chorus and The Paul Madore Chorale among others. She has also been seen as a soloist with the Portsmouth Symphony Orchestra and the Hillyer Festival Orchestra.

The 2017-2018 concert season for Erin begins in July with a performance of opera favorites alongside the Hillyer Festival Orchestra, outdoors at the beautiful Maudslay Arts Center in Newburyport, MA. In October Erin performs Baroque gems with the Falmouth Chorale on Cape Cod, include Scarlatti's aria "Si Suoni la Tromba", Vivaldi's Dixit Dominus, and the famous Bach duet "Wir eilen mit schwachen, doch emsigen Schritten" from BVW 78 with mezzo Meredith Ziegler. December brings the soloist appearances in Handel's Messiah with both Chorus North Shore and The 53rd Annual Harvard Messiah Sing. and a concert of rarely heard works by Buxtehude, Vivaldi, and Purcell with The Concord Chorale. In March, Erin will return to the Portsmouth Symphony Orchestra to perform the soprano solo in Mahler's Symphony No. 4 with Maestro John Page. In April, Erin is excited to return to the Boston New Music Initiative to perform 9 Settings of Lorraine Niedecker by Harrison Birtwistle and Three Folk Songs by Gabrielle Owens. Erin ends the season with her debut with Portsmouth Pro Musica as the soloist in the beloved Brahms Requiem.

Alexandra Dietrich, Mezzo Soprano



Alexandra Dietrich, a Puerto Rican American originally from Freeport, Maine, is a mezzo-soprano who has been praised for singing with "passion and understanding". Ms. Dietrich has performed with opera companies and orchestras including the Boston Pops, Odyssey Opera, Juventas New Music Ensemble, Boston Youth Symphony Orchestra, the Portland Symphony Pops, the North Shore Philharmonic Orchestra, the Charlemagne Orchestra of Belgium, the Midcoast Symphony

Orchestra, the Longy Chamber Orchestra, the Southern Maine Symphony Orchestra., and MassOpera where her performance as Jo March in Adamo's Little Women was hailed as "large of personality with an instrument to match", possessed "polish and star power", and was awarded the ArtsImpulse Award for Best Female Performer in an Opera for her portrayal. A frequent oratorio and concert soloist, she has recently performed with the Salem Philharmonic Orchestra, Andover Choral Society, Quincy Choral Society, Cape Cod Chorale, the Choral Art Society of the South Shore, Chorus pro Musica, and the Metropolitan Chorale of Brookline where she was an Artist in Residence for many seasons. She appears on Boston Modern Orchestra Project's Haroun and the Sea of Stories featured as Bird 5. which was recorded on the BMOP/sound label, and on Dello Joio's The Trial at Rouen as part of the Heavenly Voice Trio, which was nominated for a 2021 GRAMMY Award for Best Opera Recording. Notably, Ms. Dietrich performed featured back-up vocals for Josh Groban at Tanglewood at the Koussevitsky Music Shed. Favorite roles to date include Anita in West Side Story with Asheville Lyric Opera, Jade Boucher in the New England premiere of Dead Man Walking, Carmen in NEMPAC Opera's Carmen, and as Zita in Gianni Schicchi with the North Shore Philharmonic Orchestra, where her performance was toasted as "deliciously bitchy" (Portland Phoenix). Ms. Dietrich joined the University of Southern Maine in the Fall of 2019 as Artist Faculty in Voice where she taught for six years. She, herself, is a proud graduate of the University of Southern Maine with a Bachelor's in Music Performance, and attended the Longy School of Music for her Graduate Performance degree in Opera.

Kartik Ayysola, Tenor



Kartik Ayysola is an active classical tenor based in the Greater Boston Area. Most recently, he sang the role of Tamino in Opera51's concert production of *Die Zauberflöte*. In addition, he has also been seen as Alfred in *Die Fledermaus*, the title role of Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld*, Brighella in *Ariadne auf Naxos*, Borsa in *Rigoletto*, Don Basilio and Don Curzio in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, Monostatos in *Die Zauberflöte*, and has covered the

roles of Oronte in *Alcina*, and the title role of *Le Comte Ory*. In addition to opera, Kartik has also performed in oratorio as well, such as Saint-Saëns's *Oratorio de Noël*, Mozart's *Spatzenmesse* and *Krönungmesse*, and Handel's *Messiah*.

In addition, Kartik has also recently branched out into musical theater, beginning with Fakir in *The Secret Garden* and the Ziegfeld Tenor in *Funny Girl*.

Kartik holds the Master of Music degree from Boston University, studying with Dr. Jerrold Pope, and the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, studying with Dr. Joseph Baunoch. He currently studies voice under Bradley Williams.

Thomas Cannon, Bass



Thomas Cannon is a passionate performer and instructor of voice. Dually recognized for his "strong and striking" instrument (Opera Today) and "keen dramatic sense" (Texas Classical Review), Thomas has continually gained recognition performing technically and dramatically demanding roles that range from the classics of Mozart, Verdi, and Puccini, to the contemporary works of the American operatic stage.

Thomas appears regularly as a concert soloist. He has performed Verdi's Requiem at Carnegie

Hall-NYC conducted by Hiroya Aoki, and Delius' Eine Messe des Lebens with The American Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Leon Botstein. He has sung Haydn's Die Schöphfung and Mozart's Requiem at The Esterhazy Palace in Eisenstadt, Austria. A host of performances elsewhere have included Brahms' Ein Deutsches Requiem, Handel's Messiah, Bach's B Minor Mass, and St. Matthew's Passion. He recently performed Beethoven's 9th Symphony with The Colorado Symphony under the direction of Peter Oundjian. He has been a featured soloist with The Lied Society of Minnesota, NYC's Center for Contemporary Opera, Canterbury Voices OKC, the Walla Walla Symphony Orchestra, and The St. Cecilia Chorus of NY. Thomas' "resonant timbre [and] dramatic sensibility" (Onstage NTX) was noted in his performance of Damien Geter's An African Requiem at Fort Worth Opera, under the direction of the composer.

Dr. Cannon has performed as an artist-teacher and clinician throughout the country, and he holds a Bachelor of Music from Baylor University, a Master's in Vocal Performance from The Juilliard School, and a Doctor of Musical Arts from The University of Oklahoma. His notable teachers have included Marlena Malas, Mignon Dunn, Dr. John Van Cura, Kim Josephson, and Marilyn Horne. Further apprenticeships have included Opera North, and The International Vocal Arts Institute under the direction of Joan Dornemann. Thomas was the first-place winner of Oklahoma University's Benton Schmidt Competition, and he received a full scholarship to attend The Juilliard School. Garnered awards include those from The Dallas Opera Guild, The Chautauqua Opera Guild, The Anna Sosenko Foundation, West Palm Beach Opera, Opera Birmingham, IVAI's Silverman Prize, and The Metropolitan Opera National Council.

Thomas has served on the faculties of The University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma and The Hartt School at The University of Hartford. He currently serves proudly as an Assistant Professor of Voice at Boston University.

Grace Choi, Director



As a composer, her work has been premiered by the Orchestre National De Lorraine, France. Ensembles in Paris, at Carnegie Hall, Seiji Ozawa Hall, Chicago Museum of Contemporary Art, ISCM Festival, SUNY Stony Brook. University of West Virginia, An Die Musik, New Music Brandeis, Festival of Women Composers, Bernstein Festival, Midwest Graduate Music

Consortium at University of Chicago, California State University, June in Buffalo NY, SCI National Conference at University of North Carolina, SUNY Geneseo, University of Iowa, Ars Viva Concert in Maryland, Sounds New Concerts in San Francisco, New England Conservatory, Bowdoin International Music Festival in Maine.

She was a composition fellow at Tanglewood Music Center (Margaret Lee Crofts Fellowship), Acanthes, Paris (five times), Hochschule für Musik Franz Liszt in Germany (full fellowship), Wellesley Conference (Christoph and Stephan Kaske Fellowship), and Djerassi Arts Program in San Francisco (Gerald Oshita fellowship).

She won the ASCAP/SCI first prize, Grand Prize of the Contemporary Music Society of Seoul, Virginia Carty delillo Prize from Peabody Conservatory, and the National Association of Composers USA.

She received a full scholarship and fellowship in Ph.D. from Brandeis University and Peabody Conservatory, and received certificates from Acanthes/Ircam Paris.

As a conductor, she conducted choruses, bands, and orchestras in Atlanta, Virginia, Nevada, Indiana, New York among others. She was an Assistant Conductor at Assabet Valley Mastersingers. She studied choral conducting with Dr. Harold Rosenbaum at New York Virtuoso Singers and Prof. Marguerite Brooks at Yale University. She taught Composition at Northeastern University and Brandeis University. She's a music director at First Baptist Church in Lexington. She also teaches at Lincoln School.

Who inspired so many with the joy of music

Fondly missed and dearly loved Judy, Laura, Brendan, Jillian and Christian

Over 50 years ago Allen first brought Handel's Messiah to Pilgrim Church. He wanted to offer the community an opportunity to experience the splendor of Handel's Messiah with full orchestra, choir and soloists there in the church's sanctuary. He felt strongly that the experience was about making and enjoying glorious music together. Each year he would regale the audience before the first stroke of the concertmaster's bow with a story, a joke or even a little tidbit of musical history to pique the listeners' attention and beckon them to sit back and enjoy the captivating musical narrative of the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

We, Allen's family, are elated that Allen's vision has continued to this day and it is our sincere hope that Pilgrim Church is able to continue this time-honored and beloved church tradition for years to come.

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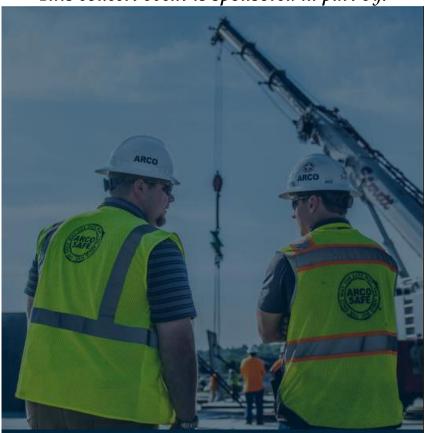
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
